


Cheryl Fowler College of St. Catherine receives Helmholz Award.

Get Up and Go! Traveling with CPAP

s our lives escalate into the fast-paced new millennium, most of us find ourselves with an increased need to be mobile. We have our calendars on palm-top computers, we commute to and from work, we travel to attend conferences, and, if we can squeeze it in, we travel for vacations to luxurious or sometimes rustic destinations.

As medical technology has advanced, our patients using oxygen, CPAP, and bi-level positive airway pressure therapy are also becoming more mobile. Light weight, portable, yet sophisticated respiratory equipment has provided them the ability to very easily "get up and go!" Respiratory Care Practitioners, especially those involved in home care or case management, can become experts on traveling with medical technology, and in turn help their patients become more independent and improve compliance with therapy.

General Travel Guidelines

It is important for all patients traveling with medical equipment to have a physician's letter or medical information form with them at all times. The physician's statement should document the need for the CPAP device and the prescribed therapy pressure. Having this available may minimize delay and security concerns at airports, and should answer any questions if the CPAP device malfunctions, or if medical attention is required while away from home.¹

When planning for their trip, it is also useful for patients to determine the location of home care companies along their route or at their destination² that handle CPAP equipment, in case of equipment malfunction. The patient's home care company should be able to provide a reference to a reputable company at the travel destination.

For most travel, size and weight of the equipment is a main concern. If a patient does a lot of recreational or business travel, you will want to equip them with one of the many lightweight CPAP devices that are specially designed to accommodate travel. Many good options exist for CPAP's weighing less than 5 pounds (less than most laptop computers).

Leaving on a Jet Plane... Air Travel with CPAP

If traveling by air, it is easy to take along a CPAP device. Patients should be instructed to use the carrying case made for the device, and to carry it onto the airplane as one of their carry-on items.



This will provide the best protection for the device and ensure that it arrives with the patient, so that they do not have to sleep through a night without CPAP.

As far as airport security, the x-ray scanners will not harm the CPAP device, but it is important to have a medical statement from the physician verifying that the patient is carrying medical equipment and documenting the prescribed use of the device. Some CPAP devices, such as the Respironics Solo Plus LX, have a medical device notation on the bottom of the machine stating that it is medical equipment.

Around the World in 30 Days


If overseas travel is planned, you will need to instruct the patient in adapting their CPAP device for 220 volt AC power. Usually, this is easily accomplished by changing a fuse and the voltage setting in the back of



the unit. Some CPAP's, such as the ResMed SULLIVAN series and the Respironics Great Performer's CPAP series (Solo Plus LX, Aria LX, and Virtuoso LX), have an internal universal power supply and automatically adapt to the appropriate AC voltage. In this case, the patient will need only the proper international plug adapter kit for the country they are visiting. Check the manufacturer's operating instructions for specifics on each device.

I'm on the Top of the World

Being at higher or lower elevations with different barometric pressures than that at which the CPAP device was originally set will affect the pressure delivered. At higher elevations, compensation will need to be made for the reduction in pressure output that occurs as altitude increases.



Almost all modern CPAP units can be adapted to change in elevation by a simple keystroke that the patient can be instructed to perform once they reach their destination. Refer to

the manufacturer's operating instructions and review this information carefully with your patient, letting them practice the keystrokes, so they are prepared in advance to make the necessary adjustment on their machine.

Certain CPAP devices have automatic altitude compensation. In this case, operator intervention is not necessary; and the machine will automatically adjust pressure output according to the barometric pressure at the destination elevation.

If the patient has an older CPAP unit without the ability to compensate for elevation, make an appointment for them to visit a home care company at their destination to have the pressure output measured and set appropriately. This will require that the patient have their CPAP prescription with them.

Off to Camp or On the Road Again

If your patient is going camping or is a truck driver and will be sleeping where there is no access to elec-



tricity, it is still possible for them to use their CPAP.

Almost all CPAP units will work on 12 volt direct current (DC) power. To run the CPAP device on battery power, battery adapter cables and a DC power cord will be necessary, as well as one or more 12 volt, 100 amp deep cycle batteries. Check with the manufacturer to be sure you know how long this type of battery will last given your patient's CPAP pressure. At average pressures of around 10 cmH2O, the 12 volt battery should last at least 24 hours. These batteries are generally heavy, so your patient will need to plan in advance for their transport.

In the case of an over-the-road truck driver who may be sleeping in his vehicle or patients that travel by motor home or boat, a DC power cord and DC interface module may be all that are necessary to use CPAP when the vehicle is stationery. This special DC cord is utilized to adapt the CPAP device to the vehicle's cigarette lighter or DC power outlet.

Manufacturers' instructions concerning DC power accessories should be consulted and followed. Most manufacturers recommend utilizing only the DC accessories supplied by them for use in their CPAP device. In fact, some warn that the "use of a different system may cause damage to the unit or vehicle."³

Bon Voyage!

As you can see, it is very simple to travel with CPAP. The keys to a successful trip with CPAP or any other respiratory device are thorough planning and knowledge of the equipment2, patient instruction from a Respiratory Care Practitioner educated in traveling with CPAP, and the appropriate device accessories.

Upon completing their travel, the patient should have the benefit of an increased sense of independence2. This may in turn improve their compliance with CPAP therapy as they begin to perceive it as less of a hindrance to living their life.
