WHERE ARE WE GOING?

hat is happening here in America? In years past, volunteerism was something our parents just did. Being raised

that way myself, there was no question that I would volunteer in my lifetime. I remember as a child, a neighboring farm that was completely destroyed by a tornado. The family consisted of two parents and an infant. The mother and baby were both killed. Immediately my dad loaded all six of us kids up in the pickup, and we spent the whole day picking up the carnage left from the tornado. I was eight at the time and remember feeling extremely overwhelmed with sadness when I found some of the child's toys; knowing that she was dead. We were all tired, filthy, and hungry by the end of the day, but I will never forget feeling very proud of the fact that we had helped someone else out in his or her time of need.

I am attempting to make the analogy that the MSRC is a small community with many needs. The MSRC provides the following on a yearly basis: three educational seminars that provide CEU's, a job fair, student/RCP presentations, and seven board meetings a year. Here is what just a few committees are working on right now. Public Relations is developing a "Membership Promotional Packet" for interested new members. Membership is updating the MSRC database and working with Public Relations to provide some novel incentives for new members and existing members. The Chronic Respiratory Disease Task Force is well on their way with Asthma camp, collaborating with the MN Pharmacists on providing education to pharmacists on spacer and MDI instruction, a website and newsletter.

We are developing a strong identity for the MSRC.

Not only are we providing and supporting education for RCP's, but we are working collaboratively with non-profit groups with similar interests such as Smoke Free Coalition, the ALA, schools, and many other organizations.

How do you fit in? The MSRC needs major involvement from front line therapists in the following areas:

- Participate as an active member on one of the following committee's: Education, Public Relations, Legislative, Membership, and multiple others to choose from.
- Involvement in Asthma camp (there are currently four asthma camps in the state of Minnesota).

Participation in the "Coalition of Respiratory Therapists for Asthma".

- Currently a chair is needed for the COPD portion of the Chronic Disease Task Force.
- There is an opportunity for two Co-Editors for the <u>Bronchus Publication</u> by the end of this year (mentoring will occur).
- There is an opportunity for an advertising coordinator at the end of this year for the <u>Bronchus</u>; also with mentoring.
- Recognize one of your own as "RCP of the Year" by submitting the form found in the "Bronchus" to Al Kendall, Past President.
 - Run for an elected office or Board position.
 - Attend at least one Board meeting a year.
- Help to develop and implement surveys on various topics concerning Respiratory Therapist's.
- Set up a meeting with your manager and ask for support for your endeavors in professional activities. If they are not able to be supportive it may be something you have to devote some of your own personal time to. Your career as a professional RCP is certainly worth it!
 - Partnering with students to provide mentorship

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
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MSRC Chronic Disease Task Force Coalition of Respiratory Therapists for Asthma

And so you ask yourself, "How can I get involved with a really exciting group of people, and do more with the MSRC at the same time?" The answer??? Become part of the Coalition of Respiratory Therapists for Asthma!

The Coalition of Respiratory Therapists for Asthma is a sub-committee of the Chronic Disease Task Force. Its focus is to promote asthma awareness and effective asthma management throughout our communities and state. This year, the Coalition has a very full agenda. Our primary areas of focus for 2000 are:

- Camp SuperKids and other ALA Asthma Camps throughout Minnesota: Providing Respiratory Therapy staff for Camp SuperKids to assist with asthma education and care of the campers. This will involve instructing the children on proper technique for use of spacers with their inhalers, use of PDI's, and Peak Flow. We also procure equipment and supplies for the camp health services to ensure a safe environment for the campers. This year, we requested and were granted a donation from the MSRC to help support all of the camps throughout Minnesota, and we are helping to provide these camps with respiratory equipment and asthma educational materials.
- Pharmacies: This year, we will be working with Cub Pharmacies to provide spacers with MDI's. Our goal is to first make sure that all of the pharmacists are comfortable instructing patients on administering an MDI with a spacer. We will continue to work with them to provide educational materials and spacers to their patients, and to track beta-agonist use along with associated orders for anti-inflammatories. We hope to have an instructional poster demonstrating correct administration of MDI's with spacers in the Cub pharmacies later this year.
- Asthma Education in Schools: Our objective in the schools is to provide asthma awareness education to school staff, including teachers, physical education teachers and coaches, nurses, health assistants, and education assistants.
- Asthma Web Site: By the end of the year 2000, we hope to have developed an asthma page on the MSRC Web Site. This page would display asthma facts, asthma educational materials, and possibly links to other asthma resources.

As you can see, we have a busy year ahead! And we are already planning fun activities for next year. A sneak peak: an asthma fun run/walk for World Asthma Day in 2001! Now, since I know you can hardly wait to get involved, I've included below the dates

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LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The committee has had two meetings so far in the year 2000. The goals of this committee include:

 Monitor and provide a liaison to legislative bodies, the executive branch or judicial

proceedings that potentially affect the practice or profession of respiratory care. We will continue to monitor and interact on the tobacco settlement money as needed.

- Ongoing communication with the AARC (specifically Cheryl West Director, Government Affairs) will occur, as needed. Continue to monitor the activities of the Minnesota State Board of Medical Practice Respiratory Care Advisory Council and provide input as necessary.
- Prepare and provide documents deemed necessary to interact with all state or national organizations.
- Monitor and act upon new issues as directed by the MSRC president, executive committee and/or Board of Directors.
 - · Representation from this group to attend the

AARC PACT meeting in Dallas, keeping us informed of AARC initiatives.

Highlights from our meetings include:

Members from this committee attended the League of Women Voter's workshop held at the state capitol in January. It was valuable opportunity to learn about the Minnesota legislature and how citizens can become more involved. This workshop is open to the public and is held every January. We will keep you posted on next year's date.

We learned first hand from one of our committee members of the work she has been leading in Northern Minnesota, around the issue of second hand smoke. Jan Salo Korby reported of the successful campaign to move to all no smoking restaurants in Moose Lake, Minnesota. There are other efforts around the state to promote these same measures. It is a huge step and CONGRATULATIONS go out to Jan and all the rest of you who are hard at work around this issue!

We are also keeping an eye on the legislation to reduce the crime to shopkeepers who sell tobacco to minors.

The committee meets again in August and November. We are always open to new members. If you would like more information, please contact Denise Johnson, 651-220-6812.



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

"Would you like fries with that?" "Soup or salad?" "Baked or mashed?" You might hear these questions in a restaurant, but one question you will not hear in Moose Lake, Minnesota is "smoking or non?" The City of Moose Lake is the first city in our state to pass an ordinance creating smokefree environments for its restaurants. Many thanks extended to Moose Lake for their foresight and wisdom. I commend the many concerned community members who worked on this project. This is a public health protection ordinance whose time has come. Environmental Tobacco Smoke (ETS) has been determined by the Environmental Protection Agency to be a class A carcinogen, the same danger as asbestos. There is no safe level of exposure to this toxin. ETS contains over 4000 chemicals and poisons, 43 are proven specific carcinogens. Secondhand smoke causes asthma, heart disease, stroke and cancer among a host of other illnesses. We in Minnesota are acclaimed for our health promotion and disease prevention. Why are we exposing food service workers and the public to this serious health hazard? It is now known that separating smokers and nonsmokers does not protect the health of the nonsmoker. The science is clear. It is time now to clear the air.

As respiratory care practitioners, we all should be taking a leading role in helping our communities pass similar ordinances across the state. We know what an asthma episode looks like. We know the people that have COPD who are further isolated by not being able to dine out or go to events where smoking is allowed. We have seen the baby in the ER with ear infections and pneumonia. We have sat with the patients who are dying of lung cancer. We know the faces and the names. We have the passion and the knowledge to educate the public. I urge you to find out more about secondhand smoke and to become an advocate for change.



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

MSRC Annual Job Fair

n March 3rd, students from 4 of the 5 Minnesota programs of respiratory care attended the annual Minnesota Society for Respiratory Care's (MSRC) Job Fair. The event, held at St. Catherine's College, allows graduating students a chance to meet with medical employers from the upper Midwest in a casual setting. The group from Rochester joined approximately 30 other students from Duluth and Twin-Cities schools to talk-shop and exchange information with employers from 21 hospitals and medical organizations. Many employers enjoy the ability to have "mini-interviews" with students, to receive copies of résumés and be to able to describe the details of respiratory care services at their institutions.

The job fair is organized through the MSRC's Student Affairs Committee in conjunction

with the schools. The initial mailing is sent to 350 medical institutions across the country with emphasis on those in Minnesota and neighboring states. Post cards are used to reserve tables at the fair as well as survey open respiratory care positions. This year RCTC/Mayo student Ms. Chris Fogarty tallied responses for job openings and displayed the positions on an Excel spreadsheet. The final job listing summary was then made available to a national

audience by placing the data on the MSRC website. http://MSRCnet.com/index1.html

Because of the rapid national growth of respiratory care services and difficulty of schools in filling classes, the number of openings were far more numerous than in past years. The job survey noted:

- 73 Certified therapist: (CRT) immediate openings
- 61 Certified therapist (CRT) openings within 6 mo
- 153 Registered therapist (RRT) immediate openings
- 122 Registered therapist (RRT)
 Openings within 6 mo
- 18 Subspecialty positions: Perinatal, sleep diagnostics etc.

The Job Fair proved to be successful both to graduates and employers, by the number of attendees & interest shown.

To provide monitoring, analysis and dissemination of information.

The key to success will be statewide involvement of all the stakeholders. As Respiratory Care Practitioners, you are one of those stakeholders. To facilitate this statewide involvement, eight regional summits of stakeholders are being held throughout April-May 2000. Summit sites include:

West Central (Fergus Falls)
April 11, 2000

South West (Marshall) April 20, 2000

Central (St. Cloud) May 3, 2000

South Central (Mankato) May 11, 2000

North West (Bemidji) May 23, 2000

Twin Cities Metro Asthma Coalition May 25, 2000

South East (Rochester) May 26, 2000

North East (Duluth) May 31, 2000

Each summit will consist of a 2-1/2 hour meeting to determine the issues and priorities of the region. The goal is to have a local asthma network/coalition formed and willing to participate in state and local asthma initiatives. Representatives from the regional summits will join together June 15, 2000 at the statewide summit to decide the priorities, which will become the work for the Minnesota Asthma Coalition.

While several RCP's throughout the state are involved with this effort, more are welcome.
